She has worked at the Manor Surgery in Oxford for the past 11 years. She has been the Clinical Lead and Chair of the Oxfordshire Training Hub since 2016 which is an organisation established by Health Education England to support training and workforce development for primary care in Oxfordshire.</p>

<p>Dr Tess McPherson MA MBBS MD FRCP</p> <p><i>Consultant Dermatologist, Senior Clinical Lecturer, Clinical tutor for undergraduate dermatology & Clinical Lead for Paediatric and Adolescent Dermatology at Oxford University Hospitals</i></p>	<p>paediatric dermatology including developing clinical guidelines and patient information for the British Association of Dermatology (BAD) monitoring effects of medications on children and young people (BADBIR registry) and is the President-Elect of the British Society of Paediatric Dermatology (BSPD).</p> <p>Skin conditions are very common and have huge impact for young people but their needs are often overlooked. Through her clinical work and national roles with BAD and the BSPD team, Dr McPherson is committed to providing better services and support for this vulnerable population. In Oxford she has established an award-winning service for young people with skin conditions that integrates psychological support. This model is now being established in other centres. The BSPD website also now has a dedicated section with information for both health professionals working with adolescents and information for young people themselves.</p> <p>Dr McPherson was lead clinician on an NIHR funded project to develop a web resource for young adults with skin disease on healthtalk.org, works with charities and patient groups to improve resources and has recently written a book; 'Skin Conditions in Young People: A practical guide on how to be comfortable in your skin'.</p>
<p>Dr John Reed</p>	<p>Dr John Reed has been consultant dermatologist and honorary senior lecturer in Oxford since 2007. He qualified from St Bartholomew's Hospital Medical College in London in 1991.</p> <p>He trained in dermatology in London and Oxford. During his training he successfully completed a PhD in immunology at University College London resulting in several publications in leading scientific journals. Following on from his research, he has developed a specialist interest in urticaria, angioedema and allergy in adults and school age children. He is a member of the British Society of Allergy and Clinical Immunology.</p> <p>His research activities include trials supporting the development of new treatments for urticaria and angioedema and understanding the impact and burden of chronic urticaria.</p> <p>Dr John Reed was the clinical lead for dermatology in Oxford from 2012 to 2021.</p> <p>He is a keen cyclist, usually taking on an annual challenge such as the Etape du Tour, and committed early morning masters swimmer, competing and volunteering as</p>

She works clinically in an NHS primary care service in South Birmingham and <i>SkinHealthUK</i> in skin cancer detection clinics in Maidenhead and Oxford. Julie is passionate about improving care for people with skin conditions through developing educational initiatives for both healthcare professionals and patients throughout the UK.</p>
<p>Dr George Moncrieff FRCP FRCGP DCH DRCOG DPD</p>	<p>Dr George Moncrieff was a GP principal in Bicester from 1985 until 2017, when he retired from his NHS practice. From 1999 he also ran an Interface Dermatology Service in the community receiving direct referrals from around 50 local GPs.</p> <p>After retiring from his NHS practice he worked in a private practice in Oxford, as well as locums in local GP practices. Last year he helped to set up a Community Dermatology Clinic in South Birmingham and was their Clinical Lead until January. He remains a Consultant to this Federation.</p> <p>He was the RCGP Dermatology Curriculum Guardian from 2010 until 2014, Chair of The Dermatology Council for England from 2014 until July 2018 and a PCDS Committee Member from 2005 until 2018.
